The concept of using Yugen as our theme developed during the creation of our convention centerpiece.

It started with asking Steve Brummé to do the artwork for convention. He came up with the idea of using a lotus flower for our first ad and having another image for our second ad and so on. Then we came to the idea that it would be better to have these separate images part of a greater whole. Through much thought and discussion, we came up with the centerpiece for our convention.

The painting, which will be our centerpiece, incorporates many different meanings and concepts. It's not so much what's in the painting, but how you discover the painting. If you have looked at the convention web site, you will have discovered many separate images -- all part of a bigger whole. It is this process of discovery that is Yugen, the theme for our convention.

When you started in Jujitsu, you were taught rolls and Yawara; you knew what Jujitsu was. You had an image of what martial arts was all about, and from your perspective, you were right. You kept coming to the dojo, learning Nage and Shime. You now had two new images of your martial art, different than the first. You still came to the dojo, more arts were introduced and pretty soon you noticed that the images (lists) were interrelated.

After a while, the images overlapped, creating a larger more complex image. This process of discovery is the idea of our theme, Yugen. If you look it up in a dictionary, Yugen translates as 'mystery'. It refers to that which is alluded to -- something just around the corner you think is there, yet have never seen.

Take your training to the next level, continue the ongoing process of completing your painting -- that's the challenge! Press your sensei to support your training through studying so hard your sensei has to reveal the next piece...beyond just requesting the next art. Seek and gain every opportunity to discover, explore around the "corner," expand and complete your artwork.

Each of our paintings is unique though it all comes from the same ryu. I am happy you have chosen to contribute your uniqueness to Convention 2001 --Yugen.

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Yugen in Daily Life

For many, the term Yugen will be heard and read about for the first time at this convention. It is a Japanese term used today mostly in painting and other artistic formats. This is largely because Yugen is a concept that some artists use to convey something in their artwork that reflects “mystery” or something unfathomable.

Martial artists use it in much the same way, but of course, with concepts and principles surrounding our art form. Because Yugen speaks to the idea of mystery, narrowing down how it is used by martial artists is difficult. Each will interpret the meaning of Yugen as it applies to themselves and their understanding of the term. Another Japanese term with a similar meaning is Myo. Myo means, again, something understood or perceived experientially that cannot be grasped by the logical, linear mind. Instead it is a state of being, or put another way, a source of creativity from within normally not tapped unless there is an intense involvement in a given activity or endeavor. For the martial artist, this refers to being in such a focused yet relaxed place that the movements made are free from design and fears, anger, doubt or other “mental stains” as they are classically referred to. Martial artists, when in touch with this inner Myo or Yugen, find a wellspring of power and creativity that allow them to succeed without mental planning or design, without the usual sources of behavior modifying emotions. Instead we find this power from deep within ourselves, not in a place we can tap ordinarily. In time, and with deep practice, we can reach, even if only for a moment, this Yugen, this inner source of understanding and creativity.

To bring this to daily life, to apply Yugen to our beloved organization, the AJJF, and Danzan Ryu Jujitsu all we need to do is, quote Daisetz T. Suzuki, “When *satori* (enlightenment) artistically expresses itself, it produces works vibrating with ‘spiritual rhythm’ (or Ki), exhibiting *myo* (or the mysterious), or giving a glimpse into the Unfathomable, which is *yugen*.” No big deal, right? In fact this can be applied and achieved using universal and observable principles defined within the esoteric principles as laid down by our founder, Professor Okazaki. Be kind; support your family in all ways; become a useful member of your community. In other words when we **serve** and in this case service that has at its heart, true selflessness vs. an inner motive or “mental stain” that literally blocks the free flow of this inner creativity. With acts of true service we find an innerspring of power and satisfaction that approximates the Yugen spoken of by many masters.

We have all heard that the work or effort of a person will be evident by the fruits they bear. All we need to do is tune in to the fruits of our efforts. Are we doing our own inner direction or desire while at the same time working in harmony with others? Are we producing results wherein the AJJF benefits in a positive and fruitful way? Or does our effort cause strain and conflict? In this way we can know if our Yugen is real and in the best interest of all. True Yugen will never cause pain or conflict when used in service of others, this being the hallmark of Danzan Ryu and the AJJF. When service that is fueled by Yugen, this inner creativity, takes place, positive and helpful developments for our organization will occur. To master or get in touch with this inner force all we need to do is find a way to serve and be of help.

On the mat, when you tap this inner creativity your art will be effortless and clean. Your techniques will feel as if your body is acting on its own and you're simply observing the interaction, a paradox often spoken of in oriental martial arts. Your progress will be certain and positive. The Katas will be fun to learn and in their performance you will experience a heightened pleasure. If you have yet to experience this, redouble your efforts, improve your concentration, and through this experience the meaning of Yugen will become apparent within Your Art. Good luck!

DanZan Ryu Jujitsu: Sandalwood Mountain Jujitsu

For five years I have studied this martial art. This painting is dedicated to a martial art whose sole purpose, according to the founder, Professor Henry S. Okazaki, is to help the student attain Satori, or enlightenment.

On the hill, Professor Okazaki sits in a circle with an ancient, a Samurai who faces a contemporary student, a woman. Okazaki is the conduit that brought this art to the present. The monolith rises out from the water with the beginning writings of this art in his own language, Japanese. The Lotus, the symbol of enlightenment, is inscribed into the stone. Lotus flowers also float on the water ignited by the flames of spirit. A sword is lifted from the water by the hummingbirds, the symbol for the ancestors. The sword represents the threat that comes to us in every generation. It is necessary to summon courage to learn the arts of self-defense and rise above the threat of dangers. In this sense, potential danger is a gift of our ancestors to create and motivate us to develop our bodies and spirits to higher levels.

Instructor Profiles

Professor Ramon Lono Ancho, Jr. began studying with Master Henry Seishiro Okazaki at the age of 10. He holds senior ranks in Kempo Karate, Kodenkan Danzan-Ryu Jujitsu, Kodokan Judo, the title of Professor in Kodokan Judo, and the title of Presiding Elder in the Kodenkan Danzan-Ryu Jujitsu Association. He earned a total of 28 combat-related citations in his military career and attained the rank of major. He has served as instructor to the 82nd Airborne Division, 1st Special Forces Group, 5th Special Forces Group, West Point Military Academy Cadet Judo Team, U.S. Special Warfare School and as Assistant Commandant of the New York Military Academy. He has acted as a bodyguard, instructed numerous celebrities, and has appeared in movies and television. A great believer in service, he not only devotes his time to charity and community activities, but at the same time earns a living in law enforcement.

Professor Tom Ball, Kudan, began Jujitsu in 1957 with Bud Odom and received his shodan in 1958. In 1964, as a yodan, he taught at U.C. Davis, and founded the first martial arts dojo in Davis since WWII. Hundreds of students from around the world studied with him during the years 1964 to 1972. Prof. Ball is currently sensei of Shingi Kan and has recently retired from teaching high school in Fort Jones, California. He and his wife, Jan, have operated Camp Kodenkan North at their ranch since 1973. Prof. Ball helped establish the AJJF's Okazaki Restorative Massage Program, now known as the Danzan Ryu Seifukujitsu Institute, and sits on its Standards Committee as Director of History and Theory. He is the current CEO of the AJJF.

Stephen Balzac, Nidan, started his study of the martial arts at the age of fourteen with Aikido and European fencing. He started DanZan Ryu JuJitsu after moving to the San Francisco Bay Area in 1989 and received his nidan in 1999. Steve has studied Choy Li Fut Kung Fu and currently practices Ten Chi Do. He is co-sensei of Kings Mountain Jujitsu, along with his wife, Aimee Yermish.

Nancy Bigham, Sandan, started Danzan-Ryu Jujitsu in 1979 and has been teaching since 1983. She received her Shodan in 1983, Nidan in 1988 and Sandan in 1997. She is

currently continuing her studies under Professor Robert Hudson, Rokudan. She was the co-founder and school head of Ketojin Dojo from 1985 to 1991. From 1988-1990, she was one of the school heads for Laurel Jujitsu in Oakland California. Nancy joined Kodai No Bushido as an instructor in 1993 and took over as joint school head with her husband, Matt, in 1995. In addition to her rank in Jujitsu, Nancy holds certificates in and practices Okazaki restorative massage. She has been approved by the AJJF to teach athletic taping to meet AJJF Dan requirements.

Todd Birdseye, Sandan, started Danzan Ryu Jujitsu in 1978 with Prof. Bud Estes & Rich Radcliffe at the Chico Kodenkan . Todd became co-sensei of the dojo in 1996 with Delina Fuchs. He received his Shodan in 1987, Nidan in 1991 and his Sandan in 1994. He is also a blue belt in Brazilian Jiu-jitsu & a purple belt in Kempo Karate.

Susan Register-Bodnar, Nidan, began her training in Jujitsu in 1986 and has earned her dan ranks through Professor Tom Ball, receiving her Nidan in 1998. Along with her husband James, a Danzan Ryu Yodan, they operate Mugenkan Martial Arts Center located in Yreka, Ca, where she is the youth instructor. She also teaches Women's Assault Prevention Clinics in coordination with the Siskiyou Domestic Violence Programs. She is a graduate of the AJJF Okazaki Restorative Massage program.

Rich Borba, Shodan, Sensei for Koden Jujitsu Kai, Started DanZan Ryu in 1975 with Prof. Gene Edwards (retired) after studying Judo with Sensei Bob Krull. In January 2001, he started a youth Judo/Jujitsu class at Koden Jujitsu Kai. A retired Law Enforcement officer from the Napa Valley, he is currently employed as a law enforcement officer in Las Vegas and is the Las Vegas Police Department In-Service Jujitsu Instructor as well as one of their Firearms Specialists.

Vern Brekke, Godan, has been studying and teaching martial arts since 1973. His jujitsu style has been influenced by the Wing Chun/karate style taught by Sensei John Marshal, several styles of tai chi chuan and chi gung, the completion of a police academy, and graduate level research in biomechanics. He has been Sensei of Ternion Academy since 1980 and is currently teaching jujitsu in Bozeman, Montana.

Jay Callender, Jujitsu Nidan , holds a sandan rank in aikido and a shodan rank in judo, and has studied several Chinese martial arts in his 23 years of training.

Professor Jane Carr, Shichidan, is the AJJF Board of Professors Records Secretary and is a past AJJF President. Prof. Carr is the Redding Jujitsu Academy Shihan, having passed the title of RJA Sensei to her daughter, Sheryl Hager. Professor Carr also holds the Modern Arnis rank: Dayang Isa, presented by Jose Bueno, but has turned the title of RJA Modern Arnis School Head to her student, Scott Redden, Lakan Isa. Prof. Carr was involved in the origination of the AJJF Massage Program, now known as the Danzan Ryu Seifukujitsu Institute. She remains as an advisor to the Standards Committee.

Sensei Kevin Colton, Yodan, is the Chief Instructor at the Santa Clarita School of Jujitsu. In 1966 Kevin started Danzan Ryu Jujitsu with instructor Joe Burlin. He received his AJJF Shodan in July of 1976 and his Yodan in 2000. Kevin graduated from the

Danzan Ryu Seifukujitsu Institute under Professor Robert Hudson in 1997. In his years of teaching, Kevin has promoted 18 students to the rank of Black Belt. Currently, Kevin is developing a self-defense course for the handicapped.

Professor John Congistre, Kudan, started his martial arts training in 1952 in Oakland, California, at Professor Ray Law's school. Prof. Congistre has studied and competed in sport judo, earning a sandan rank. His martial arts training includes, karate, kendo, and massage. He currently teaches classes at Amador Judo and Jujitsu Studio in Livermore, California, and serves as the AJJF Treasurer.

Professor Don Cross, Rokudan, began his jujitsu training in 1957 at age ten with Professors Ray and Marie Law in Oakland, California. While his primary martial art practice has always been jujitsu, Prof. Cross has extensively studied in tai chi chuan, judo, kempo, Goju Ryu, Shotokan, kendo, and Sil Lum kung fu, and he is a certified chi gong instructor with the Tian Gong International Association. Prof. Cross served on the AJJF Board of Managers as Manager of Regions and Manager of Internal Relations. As an Okazaki Restorative massage practitioner and instructor, he was instrumental in the development of the AJJF Okazaki Restorative Massage Program, now known as the Danzan Ryu Seifukujitsu Institute. Prof. Cross is currently shihan of Jujitsu-Do Martial Arts Center.

Sensei Dennis J. Estes, Godan, has practiced jujitsu since 1959 when he first began training with Sensei James Moynhan. His father, Art Estes, was his Sensei until the early 1980's. He has since been a student of Prof. Robert Hudson. Dennis has been school head of several dojos, along with teaching at community colleges and universities. He has been heavily involved teaching community based woman's self defense classes as well as children's defense awareness classes. Dennis has national certification as a police defensive tactics instructor, and he was also an instructor for both the Utah and Idaho Police Academies in defensive tactics, self defense, arrest and control procedures, PR-24 and Baton, Kubotan and Firearms. He also served as an in service instructor and was the training officer for his local police dept. Estes Sensei is currently school head of the JoBu Shin Kan Martial Arts School in Eureka, Ca.

Francis Ferris (Franko), Yodan, began studying Danzan Ryu with Professor Herb LaGue and Suki LaGue at the Bushidokan in 1986. In July of 1998, he opened High Sierra Jujitsu in Reno, NV with Cyndi Ferris and Gary Smith. Franko studied Okazaki Restorative Massage with Cynthia Frueh and travels at will (the original "wandering uke") to perfect his character and propagate Dan Zan Ryu. He volunteers often and served on the AJJF Board of Managers as editor of the Kiai Echo. Franko and his dojo will be the hosts for the AJJF's Convention 2002.

Senior Professor Lamar Fisher, Judan, has practiced jujitsu since 1948, when he first became a student of Professor Estes. He taught at the Chico Judo and Jujitsu Academy from 1950 to 1972, achieving the rank of professor in 1956. Prof. Fisher taught women's self-defense courses for 10 years at Butte College. In 1981, he became school head of the Nibukikan in Chico, California. Prof. Fisher is currently Senior Professor of the AJJF.

Delina Fuchs, Sandan, started Danzan Ryu Jujitsu in 1978 with Richard Radcliffe's junior class held at the old Nibukikan in Chico. One month later, Prof. Bud Estes and Richard Radcliffe opened Chico Kodenkan one block away. Delina and Sensei Todd Birdseye have run Chico Kodenkan since 1996 . She received her Shodan in 1987 and her Sandan in 1994. Pending approval by the curriculum committee, she will be teaching Jujitsu at Butte College this fall. She is completing her Masters in English at CSU, Chico, writing her thesis on Jujitsu, focusing on the notebook and the Mokuroku.

Cynthia Frueh, Yodan, has been training in jujitsu since 1981. She is the founder and school head of Makoto Kai, in Woodland, California. In addition to Dan Zan Ryu Jujitsu classes, Cynthia operates the AJJF Region 1 Okazaki Restorative Massage courses at Makoto Kai and serves on the Danzan Ryu Seifukujitsu Institute Standards Committee.

Barbara Gessner, Godan in Jujitsu and Yodan in Judo, began studying the martial arts in 1972 at East Stroudsburg University, Pennsylvania, where she received both B.S. and M.Ed. degrees in Health and Physical Education with an emphasis on teacher preparation. Her Master's Thesis was an application of teaching methodology to the martial art of Jujitsu. In 1976 she took over her first dojo, Portland Kodenkan in Pennsylvania, and in 1978 she became Sensei of her present school, Rutgers University Kodenkan in New Jersey, where she also teaches and will be receiving a Doctorate in Education this May. The first recipient of the Bert Aspinall Award, Barbara has served on the A.J.J.F. Board of Managers for the past 14 years, and prior to that was Director of Clinics for Region IV.

Lisa Goldoftas, Sandan, began studying Danzan Ryu Jujitsu in 1982, and is certified in Okazaki Restorative Massage. She was co-sensei of Honshin Kan from 1993-1995, when she founded Jackson Hole Kodenkan, in Jackson, Wyoming (the birthplace of the late Professor Bud Estes). Lisa was the first person to serve as Manager of Conventions. She currently serves as the Chair of the AJJF Board of Managers.

Jess Green, Sandan, began Danzan Ryu in 1971, under Prof. Gene Edwards. Jess is a recently credentialed teacher with motivation from 16 years of junior jujitsu camp. Jess has also studied Karate, Aikido and enjoys hanbo and jojutsu. Known primarily for using games to enhance junior's skills, he is happiest on the mat with future yudansha. Jess is sensei of ASOBIKAN (Japanese for playhouse) the club unified from Calistoga Jujitsu Institute and Healdsburg Jujitsu. He is honored with the responsibility of arranging the junior's mat classes at this year's convention.

Professor Robert Hudson, Rokudan, began his jujitsu training in 1971 in Oakland, California, with Sensei Mike McGurk. In addition to studying jujitsu, Bob is sifu, or instructor, of Wing Chun gung-fu, and studies Chinese internal arts such as I quan and qi gong. Bob graduated from the Okugi class taught by Professors Sig Kufferath and Tony Janovich , where he received a KaiDensho and the teaching title of Shihan. Bob is a founding member of the AJJF Okazaki Restorative Massage Program, now known as the Danzan Ryu Seifukujitsu Institute, and its Director of Technical Standards. Bob has produced three videotapes addressing the study and practice of Danzan Ryu Jujitsu.

Prof. Tony Janovich, Hachidan, began his Jujitsu study under Prof. Kufferath at the age of 12. Previously he had studied under his father, a teacher of hand to hand combat in the Marine Corps. Prof. Janovich was awarded the title of Professor in 1989, and in 1997, was awarded 8th dan, the highest degree ever given by Kufferath. Under Prof. Kufferath, he was guided and instructed through Danzan-Ryu Jujitsu, including all the "Okugi" (advanced teachings) levels and is the only person awarded a "Kaidensho" and "Mokuroku" directly from Kufferath. In addition Janovich became a master of the Okazaki system of Restoration Therapy known as Seifukujutsu under the tutelage of Prof. Kufferath. A former police officer, he has taught for the Department of Defense, various police agencies and colleges. He has owned and operated the Kodenkan Jujitsu & Restoration Therapy for 27 years. Prof. Janovich is the treasurer of a great storehouse of knowledge on the Danzan Ryu kata, history and traditions, and also holds black belt ranks in Aikido and Judo.

Professor Tom ("T.J.") Jenkins, Shichidan, began his studies of Kodenkan Jujitsu with Professor Bud Estes over 40 years ago at the Chico Judo and Jujitsu Academy. He was promoted to Professor in 1989 and is a member of the AJJF Examination Board. He teaches seminars on Kodenkan Jujitsu and is the published author of the "Japanese Martial Arts Character Dictionary." He is currently completing a new book entitled "Kodenkan Jujitsu."

Benoit Joannis, Shodan, Style: Can-Ryu Jiu-Jitsu, started out in Jiu-Jitsu about five years ago under _____ (**FILL IN**) in Ottawa,. Canada. When he's not on the mat, he is in a University of Ottawa class studying for his Masters degree in sociology.

Dave Klaus, Shodan, from Yoshin Kitsu Kai, Sensei Rich Howell, (**CALL RICH for MORE DETAILS**) works as a Public Defender in Alameda County, and is also interested in Swing Dancing.

Bob Krull, Godan, holds the rank of godan in both judo and jujitsu. Sensei Krull began his martial arts training in 1955 with Prof. Bill Montero in San Jose, California. He has since taught at many judo and jujitsu clubs throughout the world. For ten years, he was an Associate Instructor at Cahill's Judo/Jujitsu Academy in San Bruno, CA and assistant coach of the Stanford University Judo Team. Bob has been a national and international referee for the Olympic sport of Judo since 1984 and is currently the senior instructor at the Renkiohan jujitsu club in St Helena, CA. He is a senior instructor for the Daiheigan Judo Yudanshakai, the senior instructor for the Pacific Jujitsu academy in Fremont, CA, and a frequent guest instructor at the Honshin Kan Jujitsu club in Santa Rosa, CA.

Professor Kunzman, Hachidan, Sensei "Jerry" Kunzman began his studies of martial arts in San Francisco at the Taraval Street Dojo, part of the six Bay Area dojo network of Professor "Duke" Moore. He was awarded his first black belt in Aiki-Jujitsu in 1964. Since then, he has also studied Kodokan Judo and was awarded his first Judo Black Belt in 1970. The late "Bud" Estes, along with Professor Tom Ball, awarded Kunzman Sensei his first black belt in Kodenkan Jujitsu in 1975. Kunzman Sensei has also studied Iai-Jitsu, and Kyokushin Karate. Currently, Kunzman Sensei holds an 8th degree black belt in Aiki-Jujitsu, a 3rd degree black belt in Kodokan Judo, a 2nd degree black belt in

Kodenkan Jujitsu, and a first degree black belt in Kyokushin Karate. He is a founding Professor of the American Teachers Association of the Martial Arts (ATAMA).

Professor Herb Lague, Rokudan, began studying jujitsu and related esoteric subjects with his father, James, in 1951. Among the other styles of martial arts he has studied are Chinese kempo, tae kwon do, tang soo do, pi lum kung fu, sivate, kenjitsu, shotokan, aikido, and taiji quan. Herb is involved in the development of physical intervention techniques used at several state agencies (“institution waza”), offers special jujitsu training for at-risk adolescents and young adults, and hosts Camp Maui annually. A past AAU Pacific Chairman, Herb served as the AAU National Jujitsu Chairman for 12 years. He presently serves as International Chairman of AJJF Allied membership and seminars. For the last five years, he has been teaching AJJF Danzan Ryu in Asia, Europe, South America, North America/USA & Canada. Herb is also on the Board of Directors of the Ecuador JuJitsu Federation.

Geoff Lane, Godan, has been studying jujitsu at the Nibukikan under Senior Professor Lamar Fisher since 1977. He received his shodan in 1979 and his sandan in 1987. He currently teaches jujitsu at the Nibukikan in Chico, CA.

Bob McKean, Yodan, A police lieutenant with 27 years law enforcement experience, Bob holds additional black belts in Shutokan Goshin-Jujitsu, USJA Judo, Shotokan karate-do, and Daito Ryu aiki jujitsu. He graduated from the FBI Defensive Tactics Instructor Program, and is a Certified International Police Defensive Tactics Instructor.

Professor James Musselman, Shichidan, began his studies of jujitsu in 1948 at the Chico Judo and Jujitsu Academy under Prof. Bud Estes. He started many jujitsu schools in Nevada and California while pursuing a career in broadcasting and television. In 1960, Prof. Musselman was promoted to godan and Professor. He is currently Senior Instructor of the Kodenkan Institute located in Belmont, California.

Larry Nolte, Godan began training in 1958 with Prof. Tom Ball. In 1960, he was awarded his Shodan by Prof. Bud Estes and Tom Ball. He became sensei of the two-year old Medford Judo Academy in 1962. The Medford Judo Academy is one of the oldest AJJF clubs on the West Coast in continuous operation, and has been in the same location since its inception. Over 40 students have been promoted to Shodan or higher degrees. The club patch is based on a circle with a red triangle in the center. The points of the triangle stand for development of mind, body, and spirit. The black circle background represents the infinite.

Professor Imi Okazaki-Mullins, Godan, studied jujitsu in Honolulu, Hawaii with her father, Henry Seishiro Okazaki, in the dojo in the back of his massage studio. Her two other instructors were Iwa Lani Tanaka and Jackie Wong. She is now on the Board of Directors of the Shoshinryu Yudanshakai, and is the technical advisor and regular instructor at Shoshinryu of Nevada in Carson City. Professor Okazaki-Mullins often gives seminars on Fujin Goshin No Maki.

Professor William G. Randle, Kudan, began jujitsu in 1954 at Law's dojo in Oakland, conveniently located eight doors down from his grandparents' home. He opened his first dojo in 1958 in his parents' garage in Santa Monica. In 1962, he started his second dojo at the Santa Monica and Palisades YMCAs and, after a hiatus in the Franciscan Brotherhood in Ohio and Texas (where he also had a dojo at St. Edward's University), opened the Westside YMCA Jujitsu dojo in 1972. He has promoted 34 students to the rank of black belt and 4—Mike Chubb, James Marcinkus, Randall Ora, and Michael Salter—to Professor. Prof. Randle is currently the Sensei at the Westside YMCA and Senior Professor of the Shoshiryu Yudanshikai.

Professor Rory Rebmann, Hachidan, started Jujitsu in 1959 at age 11 under Prof. Ray Law. As part of his training, Prof. Rebmann studied Shotokan Karate and Bushido Jujitsu. Prof. Rebmann also holds a Godan in Kodokan Judo and a Hachidan in Goshin Jujitsu. He was awarded the Kodokan Heritage Award for 2001. He is currently the owner and head instructor of the Amador Judo Jujitsu Studio. The Amador Studio is located in Livermore, California and has produced many National Judo and Jujitsu Champions. Prof. Rebmann is the Past President, Vice-President and Central Office manager of the AJJF.

Tom Ryan, Yodan, began his martial art career in the early 1970's while in the U.S. Army. He has studied Tae Kwon Do, Boxing, Wrestling, Kodokan Judo, Wing-Chun, Kyoshu Jitsu, Improvised Combat Systems, Kuntao, Shitoyoshin Ryu Jujitsu and DanZan Ryu Jujitsu. He has been training with Professor Robert Hudson since 1985. He received the title of Renshi from Professor Kufferath in 1993. He is a Godan with Kodokan Hombu and received his Certified Menkyo Senior Master Instructor Diploma from Professor Ramon Lono Ancho, Jr. One of his many awards was being selected "1999 Jiu Jitsu Instructor of the Year" by the American Budokai Society. Sensei Ryan is the chief instructor at Palmetto Jujitsu Academy & Healing Arts Center, Inc, in Lexington, South Carolina. He is Region 5 Manager for the AJJF, a Full Instructor of Okazaki Restorative Massage, and teaches in two area massage schools. Sensei Ryan is the state representative for the American Organization for Bodywork Therapies of Asia and is actively involved with the South Carolina State Massage Board.

Randy Schuster, Yodan, began studying jujitsu in 1969 with the city of Davis Recreation program taught by Hans Schiffron (**CHECK THE SPELLING WITH RANDY**). He received his Shodan in 1981 and shortly after becoming Sensei of the Davis Judo-Kai in 1993, he received his Nidan. (**UPDATE BIO WITH RANDY**)

Aimee Yermish, Shodan, began her martial arts training in college with European fencing. She started DanZan Ryu Jujitsu after moving to the Bay Area in 1988. Aimee received her shodan in 1995 and is now co-sensei of Kings Mountain Jujitsu, along with her husband, Steve Balzac. Aimee has also studied Choy Li Fut Kung Fu, Tai Chi Chu'an, and gymnastics. Aimee is a professional teacher, working with children of all ages.

Professor Jack Wheat, Judan, with the American Jujitsu Institute (AJI), and a Sandan (1957) in Kodokan judo, earned his black belt from Instructor Ahmoo and Professor

Henry S. Okazaki in 1944, and was promoted to Professorship by the AJI in 1974. Prof. Wheat was awarded a Restoration Massage Diploma from Prof. Okazaki in 1945, and continued to instruct massage classes until 1973. He then became certified in acupuncture in Bangkok, Thailand, and has since practiced both acupuncture and massage in Hawaii, and is a member of the Hawaii State Board of Acupuncture.

Professor Clyde Zimmerman, Shichidan, began his training in Martial Arts in Sherman Oaks, California in 1959. He studied Kodokan Judo, Danzan Ryu Jujitsu, Shotokan Karate, Kung Fu and Aikido. He started the first Judo Program for the Los Angeles Parks and Recreation Department and founded a competition judo team at St. John's College. In his law enforcement career, Prof. Zimmerman has taught law enforcement agencies all over the western U.S., and has designed various law enforcement programs. He holds a California Teaching Credential, and has run several Jujitsu and Judo schools. Prof. Zimmerman and his Carson City, Nevada dojo have received awards from the Governor of the State of Nevada, and the Mayor of Carson City, Nevada. Prof. Zimmerman has received the Luciani Service Award, the Shoshin Ryu Yudanshakai Instructor of the Year Award, the American Jujitsu Institute Instructor of the Year Award and others. He is a past member of the Board of Directors of the Shoshin Ryu Yudanshakai and is often a guest instructor for the AJJF and other martial arts organizations.
